Provides appropriate and relevant types of supporting materials (e.g., explanations, examples, illustrations, visuals, statistics, analogies, quotations from relevant authorities) that make appropriate reference to information or analysis that significantly supports the presentation or establishes the presenter's credibility/authority on the topic.	The grouping and sequencing of ideas and supporting materials is relevant to the argument. Provides adequate types of supporting materials that make appropriate reference to information or analysis that generally supports the presentation or establishes the presenter's credibility/authority on the topic.	It is unclear why the ideas and materials were chosen, grouped, and sequenced in the presentation. Provides insufficient supporting materials that make reference to the information or analysis that does not adequately support or contribute to the presentation or establish the presenter's credibility/authority on the topic.
